EU Canada Mobility Program Personal Experience Report

Shortly the time of the Olympic Games with the two week long Olympic break has come. During the break we could visit countless free events and concerts and we could watch the Winter



With Control Systems I could also improve professionally and I could experience a different teaching of technological sciences. The professor of



Control Systems Mahdi Alavi held great lectures. I have studied this course before at BUTE but at SFU Mahdi Alavi thought me control systems in really small details and with mathematical exactness.



At Social History of Canada I could study about not only the social but the overall history of Canada. Professor Alan Seager thought me things about the history and culture of Canada I have never heard before. In the beginning I had to realize that I use English mostly in technological topics and my historical English skills are needed to be improved. It was really

great to learn about the history of a different culture among them, and also to see improving my historical language skills too.

At all three courses I have met great and surprisingly kind people. During this semester I met a lot of people originating from all over the world and I gained memories and friends for a life. It was really great to live in a multicultural society and to see how friendly and helpfully they can live together,

how acceptable they are with foreign people.
